From the President

With the approach of Christmas I thought it appropriate to remember a Christmas past, 104 years ago.

Charles Davey, an Australian Lieutenant, was en route to the European war in December 1914, and sent a Christmas greeting to his father, W J Davey. His father was the proprietor of the Observer newspaper in Kerang, Victoria. Charles wrote:

Dear Dad,


Best wishes for Christmas. Keeping good health. Weather rather hot. Cool nights, doing 12 ½ knots,

Yours, Chas

The greeting was on the back of a Ceylon postcard that depicted a Buddhist procession. The card was endorsed 'On Active Service AIF No Stamps Available' and was machine cancelled in Melbourne on 21 December 1914, timed nicely to arrive in Kerang by Christmas Eve.

Charles went into action at Gallipoli. When engaged in an action against a Turkish position he was shot through the hip. He was evacuated by ship to Alexandria, but died from his wound and was buried at sea on 27th April 1915, two days after the Anzac landing. He was 25 years old. The New Year turned to ashes for his father.
